REPORT OF THE CHAIR OF THE BOARD OF IS/IVCF CAYMAN ISLANDS

For the year 2023

FROM CAYMAN ISLANDS TO THE ENDS OF THE EARTH

"But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." Act 1:8



Based on Acts 1:8, it seems Cayman can aptly be described as "the ends of the earth." Many do not have an idea of our existence nor of our geographical location. Although we are a small country, the Holy Spirit's igniting power and presence have reached us.

According to the latest Economic and Statistics Office's (ESO) survey, our population is now up to

83,000 plus. Of this number, approximately 4,000 are high school students and 2,000 are university students attending the University College of the Cayman Islands (UCCI). Considering this growing and diverse population, we still have much work to do building God's kingdom in this "end of the earth."

OUR YEAR IN REVIEW

- **Staff:** God's kindness has followed Sis Latavia and allowed her a speedy transition. She has established excellent rapport with club advisors and volunteers and support came as needed on each occasion.
- **UCCI post-Covid opening:** Many students opted for virtual classes and so the club was inactive. Thanksgiving Day, November 22, 2022, provided a strategic moment for 'Tabling" and with this activity, UCCI's IVCF was revived.
- **Vacancy:** Every need is met in Christ Jesus and when the position of Treasurer became vacant, we prayed for God's provision. In a rather unique way God added Sis Sheila Thomas a former ISCF member during her high school years and now mom of an ISCF-er, she had accompanied her daughter, Paige to the 2022 AGM where the vacancy was announced. Only God... Her heart was moved, and she said "Yes!" to the call.
- **Board Retreat:** In March 2023, we took a weekend to spend time together refocusing on what matters most spiritually. Time was given envisioning the future of Cayman's ISIVCF students taking roles in strategic leadership positions in our society.
- **Fund Raising:** Cayman's fields are white, and it is time for the harvest. The school clubs, and by extension our national events, have grown exponentially and therefore our focused campaign to raise support for the growing needs of the movement. Heartfelt gratitude to Sis Gillian Bedasse and her fund-raising team (Noel Wallace, Latavia Henry-Campbell, Beverley Chin-sinn, Sheila Thomas, Juliet Osbourne and Charmaine Moss). The team's efforts were demonstrations of strides of faith and their yeoman's service.

- **Boat Cruise in May** Many of you will recall this memorable occasion to worship and fellowship with one another for a worthy cause.
- **Tenth Anniversary Dinner** November 3 is still fresh in our minds and many of us will long remember the experience. This was truly a step of faith and Pappagallo did not disappoint. Much gratitude to God and the many hands and hearts engaged to make this seemingly impossible task a reality.

Some highlights:

- 1. Key address was given by Sis Latavia. A time of celebrating God's amazing work in our schools. She closed with the song "Go Light your World" which was a fitting challenge in keeping with our theme, "Ignite."
- 2. Friends of our Ministry sent their pre-recorded greetings: Kehinde Ojo from IFES, Kurt and Laura Thiel from IVCF Link USA, and Tomy Wilkerson & family, our former staff worker and pioneer.
- 3. A very memorable segment was the cutting of the Anniversary cake by Dr. Arline McGill, our former Board Chair. She handed the cake to Sis Darlene Anderson, our current Board Chair, signifying the passing of the mantle of leadership and endorsing the continued strategic direction.
- 4. Many pictures and stories were brought to the fore by way of a slide show prepared by two of our UCCI students, Jonathan Curbello-Rankine (also a student representative on the Board) and Zeb Bush.
- 5. It was a time of great pride and joy to see the level of student participation. They led the praise and worship time, contributed various items on the program and co-hosted as Master of Ceremonies.
- 6. The banquet allowed for a time to dig deeper into the history of InterSchool Christian Fellowship (ISCF). There were special encounters with former ISCF members from JGHS (formerly known as **Modern Science High School**), such as Mrs. Julie Hunter, Mrs. Sharon Smith, and Mrs. Irma Arch. Truly a doing of the Lord.
- **CIG NPO outreach:** On September 5, 2023, Cayman Islands government conducted a meeting for all Non-Profit Organizations (NPOs). Sisters Latavia Henry-Campbell, Darlene Anderson and her husband, Mr. Joseph Anderson, were in attendance. The NPOs were reminded and advised of compliance and adherence requirements to due diligence.

ONE BIG FAMILY

We are very blessed to belong to a wider community in the Caribbean Region (CARIFES) and globally to International Fellowship of Evangelical Students (IFES). Inclusive of Cayman, there are 20 National Movements in the Caribbean. Our Regional Secretary is Marc Pulvar from Martinique, and he is assisted by Kerwin Stuart from St. Lucia. CARIFES provides training and resources to all the National Movements and Cayman is a constant beneficiary of these efforts.

October 13-16, 2022 (after the Covid lock-down) 27 delegates from 19 national movements gathered in Barbados. CARIFES shared the IFES strategic plan for 2022-2030. God's word encouraged us all to be resilient and supportive of each other as a family of believers in the entire Caribbean. There were

movements that had to start from ground zero (post Covid). Time was spent considering how to reactivate and rebuild our movements in the region.

The Cayman delegates (Sis. Latavia, Bro. Joe, and I) were warmly received in the regional conference. We look forward to sending delegates to the upcoming one in Trinidad in 2024.



LOOKING FORWARD...

Starting in 2024, CARIFES will launch an academy, which offers comprehensive leadership training programs. The aim is to hone the skills and abilities of our students and staff to be transformational agents of change in their respective spheres of influence.

Each national movement will send three students to this academy which will be virtual as well as provide face-to-face training.

On a global scale, CARIFES national movements are members of International Fellowship of Evangelical Students (IFES). The gathering of IFES every four years is called World Assembly. God made it possible for us to send three delegates to World Assembly this year in Indonesia. They will share reports and fascinating experiences. We are also thankful that IFES provided some financial support to our World Assembly delegates this year.

Worthy of mention, is the affiliation of The Bahamas Student Christian Movement (SCM) as a new member of IFES during the recent World Assembly. If you are not aware, our former staff worker, Monishka, is from The Bahamas, hence our interest and delight in the affiliation.

IFES e-learning platforms are operational and some of our board members have already taken advantage. A few of the prescribed Units are:


- 1. Engaging in the University

REPORT OF THE TREASURER OF IS/IVCF CAYMAN ISLANDS

For the period ended December 31, 2023

The unaudited 2023 financial statements have been prepared and presented below for consideration and adoption by the ISIVCF Board and membership at the January 2024 Annual General Meeting (AGM).

During the year ended 31st December 2023, the Board voted unanimously to align the fiscal year with the calendar year. The 2022 results which were previously presented and adopted at the October 2022 AGM have been restated and are now presented as at December 31, 2023. These are shown as the comparative results for the year ended December 31, 2023.

The financial year ended December 31, 2023, saw the continuation of improvements to the financial performance and position of the ISIVCF.

Following the successful onboarding of a full-time staff worker in late 2022, there was a significant increase in student activities, community outreach and promotional efforts. In 2023, much effort was placed on the growth of our student groups as well as the streamlining of the administrative functions of the organisation as shown in the increased cost of our programme supplies and materials which moved from \$23,302 in 2022 to \$48,682 in 2023.


The surplus operating result of \$12,799 against the planned deficit of \$11,379 is indicative of the stewardship and strong financial management practices of justifying expenditure, and applying prudent money management practices while expending significant efforts to ensure that all programmes and activities for the year were appropriately funded.

There was significant focus on project management and follow through over the period. The upside to this is that the ISIVCF is better able to support the subsequent year's activities in the schools as we continue to celebrate the goodness of God in the life of the movement for the past 10 years in the Cayman Islands.

FUNDING

In 2023, 41% of the total income came by way of fundraising activities primarily geared toward the World Assembly participation.

Individual monthly donations amounted to 40% of the total 2023 intake. The individual monthly donations represent the continued faithful commitment by members and the rest of the community to fund the day-to-day operations of the entity.



The 2023 fundraising efforts took the form of a May 2023 boat cruise, and the November 2023 10th anniversary dinner. Combined, these events raised \$17,468 to cover the cost of the delegation to the World Assembly.

In 2023, IFES made a donation to the national movement to offset the cost of representation at the World Assembly.

Among this year's fundraising pledges were corporate donations of \$4,000 to underwrite the cost of the world assembly trip as well as donations to offset operating costs as corporate donors came on board to show appreciation for the continued work of ISIVCF in the Cayman Islands.

I would like to pause to thank our very able Fundraising Chair, Sis Gillian Bedasse, under whose leadership, the fundraising team was able to surpass the fundraising target by \$13,853.

In June 2023, we were able to request and receive the annual IFES grant/ donation of \$2,430. These funds were used to offset the cost of student events.

Church support over the period under review was \$5000 more than 2022 and was \$3,000 better than budget. This improved showing was the result of the ongoing ISIVCF 10th anniversary church tour and promotional efforts. Individual donations fell by \$11,760 in 2023 when compared to 2022 and declined on budget by \$1,893. The primary reason for the reduced intake for general programme donations was directly linked to the ongoing support for the World Assembly visit in Summer 2023 and should not be seen as a decline in interest for the work of the ISIVCF.

Overall revenue has improved by \$27,013 year on year primarily due to the fundraising efforts of the organisation.


EXPENSES

Total operating expenses were \$7,280 better than budget primarily due to savings on the World Assembly trip (\$5,309), student events (\$3,205) and office space rental (\$2,100).

Programme supplies and materials were below budget by \$8,529 but was 108% higher than the results of 2022. The primary driver for this was that in 2022 there were no student events as the organisation was without a staff worker. In 2023, we have seen multiple student and club activities across the various campuses.

World Assembly

The organisation estimated that the cost to send three delegates to World Assembly was circa \$15,000 however, the entity was able to realize savings from flight deals due to the hard work and diligence of the Chin-Sinns thereby saving the organization thousands of dollars. Note the final cost for World Assembly was \$9,991!



Events and outreach

A number of student-led activities were held throughout the year including student retreat, club activities at the various school campuses, end of year treats, while sponsors' prayer breakfast were among some of the key events in 2023. In order to support the Cayman Brac club, the staff worker traveled to the Brac to share with them as well as having the Brac team join us here in Grand Cayman for some activities. The Watler Park walk and evangelism outreach was well supported in March 2023.

Staff Remuneration

Staff Remuneration of \$33,224 includes pension, health care, mobile and telephone allowances. All contractual obligations for pension and health care have been fully paid up as required by law. All contractual obligations to the staff worker have also been fully satisfied.

Other expenses

The organisation is paid up for all membership dues and fees to Carifes and IFES as well as rent for the office space.

The motor vehicle costs continue to rise year on year due to the age of the vehicle resulting in frequent breakdowns and the need for frequent servicing. Note that the labour for vehicle repairs is donated by Tony's Toys.

The entity remains highly liquid having improved the cash position of \$42,735 at the end of 2022 to \$62,952 at the end of 2023.

Commitments have been made with respect to the January 2024 AGM and these costs are shown as payables of \$1700. Although liabilities have increased, our overall equity has improved by \$14,498 when compared to the financial year 2022.



Looking Ahead

The 2024 budget is predicated on the need to develop the next generation of youth leaders within the movement as well as host a number of youth, community awareness, and sponsorship events.

In 2024. we will continue to partner with the current membership and donors as well as seek increased support from the wider community including corporate sponsors.

The projected cost of the 2024 programme and activities is \$73,145 which we will be funded by a range of fundraising activities and individual donations from our ministry partners as indicated below:

REPORT OF THE STAFF WORKER OF IS/IVCF CAYMAN ISLANDS

for September 2022-December 2023

I started serving as Staff Worker for IS/IVCF Cayman Islands in June 2022. God has really been faithful, and I celebrate all He has helped us to accomplish. I am also extremely grateful for the new friendships that were formed, and the support received from various individuals as well as churches.

During the period, IS/IVCF was able to conduct devotions in a few schools, host Prayer Breakfasts, a community outreach event, a student retreat, among other activities. We have also seen students saying "YES" to Jesus, engage in intriguing biblical discussions, and ask the difficult questions surrounding faith. We are enormously thankful for our committed Christian teachers, volunteers and donors for partnering with us as we seek to make Christ known in our schools.

Please see some short highlights from each school below.

INSTITUTIONS

Triple C School

The YES club at Triple C consistently has 2 meetings each week; the high school meets on Thursday mornings and the elementary school meets on Friday mornings. Several Christian teachers provide support to the club advisors, Pastor Shawn Knight and Ms. Audrey Leehong. In the 2022-2023 academic year, there were up to 30 members involved in each of the clubs, totaling approximately 60 members. The student population at that time was 380 so approximately 16% was involved in the YES club. In September 2023, the school population decreased to 287 students, of which approximately 30% are involved with the YES club; 45 students in the high school and 40 in the elementary, totaling 85 students. There was an increase in membership by approximately 15 students.

The YES club was able to participate in our See You At The Pole (SYATP) event, extending invitation to the rest of the school to join them for a time of prayer by the poles. The club usually has at least 2 student leaders. The president for this year is David Sato-Bodden who is also a member of the National Student Executive Body.

Clifton Hunter High

Clifton Hunter has 2 separate lunch times for the upper and lower schools. The ISCF club therefore has 2 separate meetings. In 2022-2023, the upper school had approximately 10 students in the club and the lower school had between 15 and 20 students each week. Since September 2023, the numbers remain the same for the upper school while the lower school has growing numbers, seeing 25-35 students each week. Student leaders were selected for both groups and the Sponsors, Mrs. Deborah Wright-Holgate and Miss Laveda Thompson, work closely with them to plan and execute the meetings. They shared that this is a historical moment for the club as this is the first time that they have been able to form executive bodies for the club and have student-led meetings.

We were able to also participate in the school's club fair and over 80 students actually signed up to join the club, but the meetings do not yet reflect those numbers. Students visited our booth to also submit

prayer requests and take gospel tracts that were being issued. Five students gave their lives to the Lord during one of the weekly club meetings and these students later received Bibles that were donated by one of our ministry partners. In November 2023, some members of Christ For All Nations (CFAN) were invited to conduct devotions at the school. This was organized by one of the teachers who supports the ISCF club there. Several students gave their lives to the Lord and the ISCF club members were given the responsibility to distribute handouts to those students to further direct them as to the next steps after accepting Jesus as their Savior.

Layman Scott High (Cayman Brac)

The Bible Club at Layman Scott High meets on Tuesday mornings in the school's library with an average of 30 students each week, representing 18% of their 165-student population. Ms. Sharon Austin, one of the Sponsors and former Vice Principal (Pastoral) is no longer at the school; Mrs. Yvette Gayle is the new Sponsor and she is supported by other Christian teachers within the school. With the help of a few board members and ministry partners, we were able to visit the school to share the Gospel in their general assembly, visit their Bible club meetings, hang out with students, encourage, and pray with them as they ate during the lunch break, and also had the opportunity to host a lunch time concert for them in the last academic year. The Cayman Islands Baptist Church (CIBC) was able to donate some Bibles to the club and we presented them to the students on their behalf.

John Gray High

At the start of the 2022-2023 academic year, the Focus Club at John Gray High School met on Wednesdays during the lunch period with a fluctuating number of students each week, ranging between 10 and 20. Since they have moved to the new building, they now have separate lunch times for the upper and lower schools and hence 2 separate club meetings each week, and a growing number of students. The total number of students currently ranges between 20 and 40, doubling the membership. Occasionally, meetings are also held just outside the lunch area, and this draws up to 80 students to those meetings. The club is very vibrant and visible in the school and models the student-led nature of IS/IVCF. The meetings are predominantly planned and executed by the student leaders, Kaily Donnegan and Johanah O'Connor, who also serve on the National Student Executive Body for IS/IVCF.

During the course of the year, the Sponsor for the Focus Club, Pastor Cassius Feare, along with some other Christian teachers in the school, managed to organize a few Spiritual Emphasis weeks which allowed us, with the help of many volunteers and ministry partners, to share the Gospel of Jesus with 60 tutorial groups. Members from CFAN were also invited to share the Gospel with the year groups. The entire 1375 population of the school was able to hear the Word of God and an invitation to follow Jesus was given, to which approximately 50 students responded with lifted hands, saying YES to Jesus.

Cayman Prep and High

Prior to 2022, there was a struggle to establish an active IS/IVCF club at Cayman Prep and High, despite many attempts. Today we celebrate the work God has been doing in the school and the willingness and commitment of the Sponsors, Mrs. Galen Brown and Ms. Renece Clarke. At the last club fair, we were able to set up a booth and promote the Impact club at the school. Ten students signed up to join but 4-8 actually attend the weekly meetings which are held during the very short lunch break on Fridays. The population of the high school is approximately 525; we pray that more students will be impacted through the ministry.

IS/IVCF was also granted permission to host our last Prayer Breakfast in the school's canteen. We were also able to do a prayer walk around the school. We are extremely grateful to the principal and staff for their willingness to host us.

Cayman Islands Further Education Centre (CIFEC)

The population of CIFEC is 243 students. IS/IVCF had the opportunity to share the Gospel with the entire school during their general assembly a few times throughout the period and was able to share across the different tutorial groups as well, with the help of some committed volunteers. We also had a club launch at the school, setting up a booth to promote the Christ 4 Life club and invited students to sign up to join the club as well as paste their prayer requests onto our prayer chart. A number of students wrote their prayer requests but refused to join the club. There is currently no active club at the school but when we utilize opportunities to share the Gospel, they have been quite attentive and cooperative. The 3 sponsors are Mr. Bernard Turner, Ms. Anita Love and Mrs. Brett.

University College of the Cayman Islands (UCCI)

Following a club fair at UCCI in 2022, several students signed up to join the club but only about 4 students consistently attended the meetings. We were able to set up a booth in the courtyard on other occasions to promote the club and have seen our numbers increase over the past year. The meetings are held on Wednesday afternoons during a time slot that was designated to clubs and societies, however, some classes have been inserted in this period and so some students are not able to attend the meetings. We currently have a weekly attendance that ranges between 10-20 students but over 30 students are in our WhatsApp group. Paul McKenzie and Abygale Elliot are the club's President and Vice President respectively; they also serve on the National Student Executive Body.

The IVCF club has had the opportunity to host a Worship in the Courtyard event twice. Six students gave their lives to the Lord at the most recent one. I also had the privilege to share the Gospel with approximately 80 students who are part of the Dual Enrollment Program. At our See You At The Pole event, a number of students boldly walked to a pole in the center of the courtyard and prayed for their peers.

Other Institutions

- **St. Ignatius**: We do not have a group at this school, but we have had participation of a few students at some of our events. We hope to identify a Christian teacher who would be willing to help us establish a club there.
- **George Town Primary**: IS/IVCF mainly focuses on secondary and tertiary students. We therefore partner with Child Evangelism Fellowship which targets the primary schools. IS/IVCF had the opportunity to conduct general devotions in the school.
- **First Baptist Christian School**: We have already had discussions to have a club established at this school. We hope to start promotions among students in January 2024.

NATIONAL STUDENT EXECUTIVE BODY

As a student-led organization, we also give attention to leadership development among students. We give them opportunities to plan and execute club meetings in their schools, with guidance from the Sponsors.

In August 2023, we were able to establish a National Student Executive Body which consists of students from different schools on island and these students help to plan and promote our events at the national level. These students are Abygale Elliot (UCCI), Paul McKenzie (UCCI), David Sato-Bodden (Triple C), Johanah O'Connor (John Gray High), Kaily Donnegan (John Gray High), Raldayne Thomas (Cayman Prep & High), Joelle Pindling (Clifton Hunter), and Jon Marc Thomas (St. Ignatius).

We were able to start off the 2023-2024 academic year with a vision-casting meeting via zoom and hope to have a leadership training soon, to include other student leaders.

EVENTS

Community Outreach

In March 2022, IS/IVCF hosted an outreach event in the Watler Park community (commonly referred to as Dog City). One volunteer, Mrs. Prudence Chuck, cooked 2 types of soup, and other volunteers from Savannah United donated sandwiches and water. Students from different schools across the island, along with several adult volunteers, went out in groups to distribute the soup, sandwiches, and tracts to the residents. We were also able to encourage and pray for those who allowed us. In one instance, one resident shared, in tears, that our visit came as an answered prayer and a reminder to her that God loves her.

Discipleship Retreat

Our IS/IVCF theme since 2022 is "Ignite." We were able to host a 1-day retreat for the students under the subtheme, "Light of the Campus." We had 30 students in attendance, with representatives from all 7 groups that are part of the ministry, including 5 students from Layman Scott High on the Brac. Students were encouraged to learn more about Jesus, the Light of the world, and challenged to be reflectors of His light everywhere they go, including on campus. They were able to study Ephesians 5:1-20, while learning how to use the Inductive Bible Study method.

10th Anniversary Celebrations

The year 2023 marks 10 years since IS/IVCF was officially established in the Cayman Islands. We decided to celebrate this milestone with a boat cruise, anniversary banquet, as well as a church tour. The latter was a channel to say thanks to the churches that have been supporting the ministry, spread awareness about the ministry, and invite new partners. We hope to continue with the church visits in 2024.

IFES World Assembly 2023

IS/IVCF Cayman Islands is an affiliate member of International Fellowship of Evangelical Students (IFES), which is also the umbrella organization for various campus ministry groups in over 164 countries worldwide. In August 2023, IFES hosted World Assembly in Indonesia. This event is held every 4 years and provides an opportunity to reconnect with the global fellowship, re-engage with vision and values, and re-commit to our shared mission of building students into communities of disciples. The conference provides a rare chance for



students, graduates, faculty, staff, board members, and supporters to gather from around the globe, and be inspired and equipped for our shared calling to student ministry. The delegates for IS/IVCF Cayman were Abygale Elliott (student leader at UCCI), Dr. Erica Gordon (Board Secretary) and me (as the only staff).



There were 845 participants at the conference and over 160 countries were represented. The theme was "*Tabah Dan Tangguh, Witnesses in the University and Beyond*". Tabah Dan Tangguh are Indonesian words that epitomize strength in the face of adversity, perseverance, faithfulness, and resilience. Since the last World Assembly, a lot of individuals have had to deal with all kinds of challenges, such as persecution, disappointment, political turmoil, or war. The challenge that was however common to us all was the loss and disruption caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. This conference afforded us all a unique privilege to meet with our Lord and Savior, in the

company of our global family. The meeting "venue" was the Book of Psalms!

As we journeyed together through the Psalms, we were able to lament the injustice and evil that exists in our world, be reminded that God is present in our pain and sufferings and that we can be confident in God's character and work in our world. Some of the recurring themes/nuggets from the sermons, seminars and small groups are:

- God is faithful and the unfaithfulness and infidelities of man can never outdo God's faithfulness and fidelity toward us.
- God is a just God and He loves justice.
- God is our safe place and refuge; salvation comes from Him.
- We can be real with God with all our emotions. None of our feelings/emotions can shock Him.
- God is in control and is the answer to all the problems in our world.
- To be witnesses in the University and beyond, we must abide in Jesus, the True Vine. Abiding is a unique bond; it is a bond of love, not a religious duty.

Abygale and I had the opportunity to lead small groups at the conference, providing us with a further opportunity to discuss the scripture message and other matters in our individual contexts; we also spent time praying for each other. The members of my group were from the USA, Cambodia, Lesotho and Ecuador. Abygale and I were also invited to join the praise team which had us learning how to sing in other languages. This was quite a refreshing experience. Through this conference, a whole lot of connections and friendships were formed.

It was also eye-opening to hear some of the stories from delegates from other countries. There were persons present who were literally persecuted because they chose to believe in Jesus. We hear these stories all the times over the news, and other media; but when you are having meals and conversations with these individuals, and seeing evidence of the scars that were made on their skins, just because of their faith, it hits you differently. One individual, when asked what it is like being a Christian in her country, said it meant putting their lives at risk, walking on thin ice with the fear of being exposed and thrown into prison or taken away to an unknown place. She shared that she was held under house arrest in her room for years, losing her voice because she wasn't allowed to speak, and was frequently threatened to be beaten or killed. She had to smuggle Christian literature through her window and hoped that no one in her family found them. This is in stark contrast to our lives in the Caribbean; a lot of times we take our freedom to worship and openly express our faith in God for granted.

The year 2023 marks 75 years since IFES was founded. This milestone was also celebrated at the World Assembly. The overall experience of the conference was really refreshing and inspiring. It was also lovely for me to reconnect with individuals I had met at other IFES events in the past, while forming new bonds. Now I look forward to the regular check-ins with my small group members and new friends; I especially look forward to my one-on-one mentorship meetings with Dr. Annette Arulrajah, a Malaysian, who serves as the Associate General Secretary for IFES.

TESTIMONIALS FROM ABYGALE AND DR. GORDON ABOUT CONFERENCE

ABYGALE ELLIOTT

"Student Gathering:

For me, this prestigious gathering (World Assembly) started on the 31st of July with the student gathering. During 'student gathering', like the name suggests, the various student delegates got to spend time together. We had morning devotions, games and activities, panel discussions, and sermons.

The first speech was on the DNA of the IFES movement. We learnt that evangelism and discipleship is our mandate. It goes deeper than just spreading the word, we must confront the serious issues, engage on campus, engage in student affairs, conduct our academic affairs in the right way, and ensure that our organizational affairs are in order. We discussed the issue of having different beliefs within Christianity and how it may cause a division. In order to break down the walls, we have to ensure that it is never about who is correct or what churches say, but we should focus on what God says.

The second speech was on Engaging the University, where we were encouraged to rethink what we have learnt. We have a basic understanding at times, which is why people do not like to listen to us. We should ask questions and these questions are not because we do not have faith but because we want stronger or active faith.

In the evening session we went through the life of Joseph in three phases, the dreamer, the victim and the discerning leader. We also shared testimonies, which was very encouraging. Throughout the student gathering, we had panel discussions that allowed us to have a better understanding about our role as student witnesses in the university.

A Journey through the Psalms and Evening sessions:

We went through Psalms 1, 2, 9, 16, 27, 88, 90, 105, 106, and 145. It was wonderful to have a different and deeper look into the Psalms that we would have been reading throughout the course of our lives. We discussed true happiness which is God-centric and not self-centric, just judgment, God's faithfulness, and true confidence coming from who God is and not who we are.

The most significant thing I learnt throughout this journey was to lament instead of running away from God. We were taught how to be resilient witnesses who can propagate ministry amidst the challenges we will face. This is what the theme 'Tabah & Tangguh' truly represented. In the evening sessions, we discussed the university as our context, creation care, mental health, justice, and arts and creativity. The most significant takeaway I have is that you can train yourself in forgiveness, compassion, and gratitude, which are linked to less depression and higher well-being.

Conversatario and Seminar:

In my conversatario, I learnt about women in God's kingdom work. We focused on various women who were leaders in the Bible - Miriam, Deborah, Huldah, and Esther. We also looked at women in the IFES movement. Women are important in the kingdom, and we can do great things with God on our side. In my seminar, I learnt about how I fit in the body of Christ. We spoke about how we are like a physical body, the fact that we need to be self-aware, not comparing ourselves, and being united. We are one body of many, we are individuals with uniqueness, we have equal importance, and we should grow together.

Small groups and Excursion:

In our small groups, we were able to discuss what was learnt during our session about the Psalms. We were from different regions, with different life experiences, and we were all in different age groups. During discussions, members were able to share wisdom from different walks of life. It was also interesting to hear about the movements in different regions, how they operate, and the issues they face. My small group members inspired me to turn to God amidst my struggles, storms, and trials. They also helped me to understand that it is okay to ask God "why?" and it does not mean I have no faith.

We all had the opportunity to choose an excursion, I chose to go to Sea World. It was a short trip as it was in the same vicinity as the hotel. We saw many different animals and were able to connect things we saw to what we previously learnt about creation care and appreciate God's creation.

Overall experience:

World Assembly was fun-filled and spirit-filled. I was inspired by the testimonies of others and how others operate their national movements. I was a part of the worship team for both World Assembly and the student gathering, where we sang in different languages, I appreciated the inclusivity. Furthermore, I got first-hand experiences of other cultures and was able to practice some Spanish that I learnt in school.

I have managed to build some connections that I hope may last a lifetime. God has truly used this gathering in an exceptional way. I am now more equipped to spread the gospel at my university and other campuses. The days spent were a blessing and I hope to attend other IFES-related events."

DR. ERICA GORDON

"Going to World assembly was a great experience for me. It was truly an enlightening, and a refreshing one in which I witnessed people from over 100 nations coming together to worship and plan together to reach students with the gospel and disciple then.

Various aspects of the proceedings stood out for me:

- The issues that we were encouraged to get involved with: social justice, protecting the environment, sexual harassment, mental health, from a practical and spiritual perspective.
- The praise and worship sessions were wonderful, uplifting, joyful and inspiring occasions. We worshipped in three main languages: French, Spanish and English. It was fulfilling to see the transformation that took place when people were able to worship in a language that they understood. Indeed, as one person pointed out, it is a glimpse of heaven as recorded in the Book of Revelation, where we will witness people from every tongue and tribe and nation coming together, praising, and worshipping God.
- The Bible study focus on the Psalms encouraged us to both rejoice and lament, acknowledging God in both good and challenging times. The small groups, led by students, were also encouraging as it became an opportunity for the students to find and make their voices heard.

One of the most impactful lessons learned at the conference was the reality of students who live in countries where they are persecuted for being followers of God. Their reality came home to me in a new and striking way. Now, when I pray for the persecuted church, it is not in abstraction but with an acute awareness of the hardships they endure and the liberties we take for granted.

Friendships were formed; connections were forged; hearts were touched, and we were challenged to take the gospel to the university and beyond."
